CLARKSTON, GEORGIA — Chris and Grace Ann Cashen

Evangelist Chris Cashen writes, "As Jesus speaks of separating sheep from goats upon His return, He references works done by the faithful. We may be tempted to think of these works (Matthew 25:35-36) as blessings for the recipient. Yet, as the work in Clarkston continues, we are learning that it is the worker who is blessed. Beginning in April, we have had the great privilege of ministering to a young asylum-seeking Christian from Africa. Imprisoned in his home country, he was beaten for trusting only in Christ. Fleeing Africa, leaving everyone and everything behind, he sought refuge in the US. At the border, he was immediately placed in ICE detention, where he has remained since December 2018. Despite his imprisonment - despite his beatings - despite his 20 month-long detention in the US, he remains faithful to his Savior. While all of us have recently 'suffered' through lockdowns (with much grumbling), this young man has truly suffered. Nonetheless, as he waits patiently upon the Lord (Prov 27:14), he prays that he would learn all that Jesus would teach him through his current detention. As we minister to this one in prison, this stranger, we are the ones being blessed by his joy in Jesus. Please pray for the Lord's mercy to be poured out upon our dear brother in Christ."
