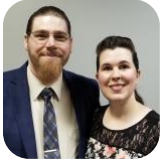

Each time we get a bit more of their story and they are progressively more interested in hearing our story of faith in Jesus Christ. Right now, we are trying to show that their experience of growing up around Christianity is different than the faith we have in Jesus Christ.
